# **RECYCLING CHANGES**

You may have already heard the news, but the MCSWMA recycling program, which we participate in, will no longer be accepting glass as a recyclable item. Unfortunately, there is currently no market for glass that makes it worthwhile to sort and process. It also causes

excessive wear to equipment at the landfill, contaminates other recyclable products, and is a safety hazard to employees. So, glass is to be thrown in the trash.

This decision was not made easily, and landfill staff will continue to monitor the recycling program to ensure they are providing a realistic, sustainable, and financially feasible service that benefits the entire County.

Glass will no longer be accepted for recycling.



# **WE HAVE A ROAD!!**

October 25, 2017 was a big day for Sands Township: on that date the Silver Creek Road connection to M553 officially opened. The road was a 2-year project that was over 20 years in the making. This more direct route cuts travel time for our Township Fire, Emergency and Sanitation vehicles as well as for residents traveling across the township. Slated for completion by October 31st, our contractor, Oberstar, finished the job early while the Marquette County Road Commission provided engineering and construction oversight services. The County Road Commission formally adopted the road and will conduct routine maintenance. Soon we'll have a street sign on M553 saying Silver Creek Rd!

# **RECYCLING INFORMATION**

The response to recycling has been encouraging, and we hope that even more households decide to participate in the future. Our Transfer Station staff has asked for these reminders regarding proper recycling:

- Materials must be clean. Rinse out your containers.
- Used napkins, Kleenex, and paper towel are NOT recyclable. Those items belong in the trash. <u>Rolls</u> from toilet paper and paper towel can be recycled.
- Unfortunately, plastic bags and plastic wrap are not recyclable through our program. Many stores offer recycling for plastic bags.
- Flatten items when possible. This includes cardboard boxes, but also plastic jugs, water bottles, etc.
- Glass is no longer accepted.

# **TOWNSHIP SURVEYS**

We want to make sure we are keeping in touch with residents and communicating Township information effectively, and in ways our residents want. # WINTER VEHICLE SAFETY

Even the most seasoned winter driver can find themselves in an emergency situation involving winter driving. Here are some winter survival tips in case you become stuck and are awaiting rescue.

- Carry a Winter Survival Kit in your car that includes—a shovel; windshield scraper and brush; flashlight with extra batteries; battery or crank powered radio; water; snack food and energy bars; matches and small candles; extra hats, mittens and socks; a first aid kit; pocketknife; blankets or sleeping bag; tow strap or rope; road salt, sand, or cat litter; jumper cables; emergency flares and reflectors; fluorescent distress flag and whistle; and a cell phone adapter to plug into vehicle lighter.
- · Prepare your vehicle: Make sure you keep your gas tank at least half full.
- · Be easy to find: Tell someone where you are going and the route you will take.
- If stuck: Tie a fluorescent flag (from your kit) on your antenna or hang it out the window. At night, your dome light may be seen by rescuers. To reduce battery drain, use emergency flashers only if you hear approaching vehicles. If you're with someone else, make sure at least one person is awake and keeping watch for help at all times.
- Stay in your vehicle: Walking in a storm can be very dangerous. You might become lost or exhausted. Your vehicle is a good shelter.
- If you must leave your vehicle, write down your name, contact information and destination. Leave the note inside the front windshield for someone to see
- Avoid Overexertion: Shoveling snow or pushing your car takes a lot of effort in storm conditions. Don't risk a heart attack or injury. That work can also make you hot and sweaty. Wet clothing loses insulation value, making you susceptible to hypothermia.
- Fresh Air: It's better to be cold and awake than comfortably warm and sleepy. Snow can plug your vehicle's exhaust system and cause deadly carbon monoxide gas to enter your car. Only run the engine a few minutes an hour and make sure the exhaust pipe is free of snow. Keeping a window open a crack while running the engine is also a good idea.
- Don't expect to be comfortable: You want to survive until you're found.
- Call 911 on your cell phone. Provide your location, condition of everyone in the vehicle, and the problem you're experiencing. Follow instructions and do not hang up until you know who you have spoken with and what will happen next. Where cell phone signal strength is sketchy, a text may go through.

#### TRANSFER STATION INFORMATION

Our Transfer Station is available for both recycling drop-off, and waste acceptance. This service is for residents only. There is no charge for recycling, but you must separate the fibers from rigids. Waste is accepted for a charge, which starts at \$10 per truck load.

The Transfer Station does not accept household garbage, appliances with Freon, brush, concrete, or hazardous waste. For questions on what is accepted or how to dispose of these items, you may call the office at 249-9169.

The Transfer Station is open every Wednesday from 4—7 PM. From January—March, it is open only the 2nd Saturday of the month from 10 AM—5 PM. Beginning in April, it is open the 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month from 10 AM—5 PM, in addition to every Wednesday.

Township Board meetings are the <u>2nd</u> <u>Tuesday of every month at 7:00 PM.</u> Minutes are posted at the Township Office and Fire Hall #2. Approved minutes are available on our website.

The public is welcome to attend all meetings.

Monthly department reports are posted at the office. Stop in to keep updated on Township information.

The Fire Department meets the 2nd and 4th Thursdays of the month at 7:00 PM at Station 1. The public is welcome to attend.



# Garbage Crew Reminders:

Have your garbage out by 5 am.

Do not put out large items or bags heavier than 30 pounds for pickup.

If animals get into your garbage, it is your responsibility to clean up.

Do not allow others to bring garbage from other municipalities.

Replace any cans that are cracked or broken.

# COURT RESURFACING

This past summer, the tennis courts and basketball courts at the Township Park were resurfaced with a new sports surface. In addition to the two tennis / pickleball courts and two basketball courts that were already there, four more pickleball courts were lined on the basketball courts. Even though the work was completed late in the season, several groups of people got to enjoy the new playing surfaces and the positive responses were overwhelming. We hope to see even more people using the park and the courts next summer.



# WHAT IS THIS?

No, this strange contraption on our basketball court is not garbage, something left over from the resurfacing, a disc golf basket, or a UFO. It is snow measuring equipment from NASA placed there by Michigan Technological University. NASA and MTU are partnering on a project to measure snowfall at several areas throughout the Upper Peninsula and we thought it was an interesting project and agreed to be one of the measuring sites. Students from MTU set the equipment up in November and will be monitoring it throughout the winter season.

# MARIHUANA FACILITIES ORDINANCE

Given changes in Michigan law and inquiries from entrepreneurs, the Sands Township Board adopted a Marihuana Facilities Ordinance. Michigan's Medical Marihuana Act (2008) allowing qualified patients and caregivers to use and provide marihuana for specified medical conditions has not changed. That law was amended in 2016 to clarify specifics regarding parts of plants allowed. Also passed in 2016 was the MI Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act (MMFLA). We note that marihuana is spelled with an "h" rather than a "j" to be consistent with federal statutes. Currently 29 states and the District of Columbia allow either medicinal or medicinal and recreational use of marihuana.

The MMFLA states that facilities may be allowed by township, village or city ordinance in conjunction with State of Michigan licensing. The law included an implementation delay of 365 days – until December 15, 2017 – so MI Department of Licensing & Regulatory Affairs (LARA) could develop a licensing system. MMFLA authorizes five types of facilities, establishes a Medical Marihuana Licensing Board, limits cross-ownership of some facilities, requires seed-to-sale tracking, and imposes taxes and fees on medical marihuana facilities. Facilities allowed by law are growers, processors, provisioning centers, safety compliance, and secure transporters. Local ordinances specify which type and how many of these facilities are allowed. Once a local permit is obtained, prospective business owners must apply to the State of Michigan for licensure, a process similar to securing a liquor license.

Sands Township considered allowing facilities for several reasons. These include supporting appropriate medicinal marihuana uses provided by the 2008 law; business opportunities for light industry consistent with the Township's 5 Year Master Plan; employment opportunities for highly skilled, professionally trained people (e.g. chemists in safety compliance); and revenue sources (property taxes on businesses, annual administrative fees, state shared revenue from retail sales).

The Township Board held an informational forum on October 10, 2017 after which the proposed ordinance was revised for the November board meeting. It was shared with the Planning Commission for their review and on December 12<sup>th</sup>, a public hearing on the ordinance was held. As a result of the public hearing, the Township Board adopted the Sands Township Marihuana Facilities Ordinance. Submitted by: Darlene Walch, Supervisor

# **CEMETERY INFORMATION**





# PETER WHITE PUBLIC LIBRARY NEWS

Staff are busy at Peter White Public Library as they continue to develop a variety of services and opportunities for all ages. Technology usage is an ever-growing area at the library. The technology coordinator, Nicki Malave, manages three networks, 90 computers, and a variety of other devices such as laptops and tablets. There are numerous computers available for use by patrons, and Nicki enjoys helping patrons with technology support. Stop by, say hello to Nicki, and learn some new tips on using a computer and/or mobile devices!

During the fall, special programs on health issues were offered by various local physicians in collaboration with Upper Peninsula Health Systems. For example, in September, Dr. Amanda Johnson spoke to an audience about "Memory Care & the Role of Neuropsychology," and Dr. Conway McLean presented to an audience about "Care of the Diabetic Foot."
