NEW RECYCLING AND TRANSFER FACILITY

Late last summer, we were awarded a grant from EGLE for \$221,328 towards a new Recycling & Transfer Facility. Our current system of two covered roll-offs outside at the Transfer Station is not efficient, and we had been researching more economical ways to offer recycling to our residents. The transfer station building itself is also no longer meeting our needs as well as we hoped, and this grant was an opportunity to design a facility to meet our needs.

The new facility will have indoor collection bins for trash, recycling, glass & metal. The structure will also house our garbage truck and backhoe loader. If we are able to find an outlet, we would also like to be able to collect other items for recycling (electronics, batteries, etc.). Future plans also include accepting compostable yard waste and brush, which could be turned into an end product residents could use in gardens and other projects.

The new facility will be located on the same property as the Township office and park, although it will have a separate entrance from M-553. The land was cleared this fall, and the site is prepared for when the snow melts and weather allows for construction to begin.

Bittner Engineering was awarded the bid for engineering, and we will be seeking bids this winter for a contractor for the project. The intent is to have the new facility operating by September 2020. Once we are fully moved to the new facility, we will put the other property up for sale.

WINTER POWER OUTAGETIPS

The heavy snow before Thanksgiving left many of our residents without power, some for several days. While you cannot avoid emergencies like this, there are ways to ensure your family and home are prepared and stay safe.

Before a Power Outage:

- Have flashlights and a battery powered radio available, along with extra batteries.
- Review your home—know how to shut off water valves, learn how to open an electric garage door manually.
- Have an emergency heating source and fuel available.
 Make sure the area is well ventilated.
- Have spare drinking water available for people and pets. If you suspect you may lose power, fill your bathtub and other spare containers with water. Pouring water from the tub into the bowl can flush the toilet.
- Go over emergency information with family members.
 Have an emergency kit prepared.
- Discuss any medications that need refrigeration with a pharmacist. Have a plan and extra batteries for any medical devices that need power.

During a Power Outage:

- Dress in layers, including a hat, to stay warm.
- Unplug appliances and turn off lights to protect electrical overload when power is restored.
- Keep the refrigerator door closed as much as possible. Move milk, meats, cheeses, etc. to the freezer. If the freezer is only partially full, group items together to keep each other cold.
- Hang blankets or cardboard over windows for insulation. Find a well-insulated room for living until power and heat is restored.
- Check on neighbors, especially the elderly and others who may have special needs.
- If you have an alternate heat source, make sure things are ventilated properly. If you have a generator, make sure it is used properly.

2020 Election Information

2020 will be a busy election year! The Presidential Primary will be Tuesday, March 10. This is considered a "Closed Primary" and voters must choose if they would like a *Democratic, Republican*, or *No-Presidential* (local issues only) ballot. You do not register to vote for a certain party ahead of time, but must declare at the polls which type of ballot you would like. The primary election will be August 4, 2020 and the general election will be November 3, 2020. Polls are open from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. on election day.

There have been several changes to election law in the last couple years, one of which allows for no-reason absentee voting. That means that any registered voter may request an absentee ballot up to 4:00 p.m. the day before an election. Sands Township now has a permanent absentee voter list. This does not mean you will be automatically be mailed a ballot for each election. You will automatically be mailed an application for an absentee ballot for each election, which you will need to fill out, sign and return in order to be issued an absentee ballot. Absentee voters will see a change this year in the envelopes used to receive and return the ballots. The State has worked closely with the Post Office to create an envelope that should eliminate some of the problems currently encountered with ballots in the mail system.

Voters may register to vote by mail up to 15 days before an election, or may register in person at the Clerk's office 14 days or less before an election, or at the polls on election day (with proper proof of residency). TRANSFER STATION INFORMATION

Our Transfer Station is available for both recycling drop-off, and waste acceptance. This service is for residents only. There is no charge for recycling, but you must separate the fibers from rigids. Waste is accepted for a charge, with a fee structure outlined below. We accept cash or check; if you pay with cash—please bring small bills.

The Transfer Station does not accept household garbage, appliances with Freon, brush, concrete, or hazardous waste. And please—nothing that will smell! For questions on recy-

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The Transfer Station is open every Wednesday from 4—7 PM year round. Weekend hours from January—March are the 2nd Saturday of the month from 10 AM—5 PM. Beginning in April, it will be the 2nd and 4th Saturday of the month from 10 AM—5 PM, in addition to every Wednesday.

TRANSFER STATION FEES

Beginning December 1, a new fee structure took effect at our Transfer Station. This was put into place after a careful review of our costs, and discussion on the different types of materials and loads being brought to the Transfer Station. The original fee of \$10 per load was set 1992 and had remained relatively unchanged the entire time, although some larger loads were charged more and a very small load may have been charged less. Over the last 27 years, costs for hauling and disposal of the trash, wages, electricity, and other expenses have increased. The landfill tipping fee has increased almost 50% over the last 5 years. With only factoring in the cost to haul a bin to the Landfill and the average tipping fee per bin,

it costs an average of \$450 to haul and dispose of 1 bin of trash. That does not take into account wages, expenses for the backhoe and other equipment, or other operating costs of the Transfer Station (plowing, electricity, etc.). Based on figures from January through September, we collect an average of \$218 per bin. It has come to a point where we could no longer support trash collection at the Transfer Station without increasing the disposal fees.

Because we do not have a scale or a way to charge an exact amount, this fee structure

is based on volume/estimated weight. Large items (couches and other furniture with metal inside), items not easily crushed (wood or building materials), or heavier items (shingles or drywall) may be charged more.

When hauling to the Transfer Station, please have cash or check available. We do not accept cards. And please—small bills only. It can be difficult to make change for large bills.

MARQUETTE COUNTY RECYCLING PROJECT

An already tenuous recycling market took a hit when China announced it would no longer accept recycled plastics. Fluctuating fiber markets, no outlet for glass recycling at all, and Marquette County's rural location also created struggles for local recycling.

Enter Recycle 906, a recycling plan tailored to the U.P.'s small population and location. This plan is the result of consideration and careful analysis by the Marquette County Solid Waste Management Authority, and collaboration with local elected officials. It creates one larger recycling plant, located at the Marquette County Landfill, to collect, sort, and process recyclables to prepare them for market.

The new program will make our Landfill the recycling center for all of Michigan's Region 1 (Upper Peninsula). The program will accept single-stream recycling (mixed papers, cardboard, plastic, metal), as well as glass, and talks are underway with other counties in Region 1 about agreements to receive their single-stream recycling.

Remodeling plans for two existing structures at the Landfill are in place, with renovation set to begin January 2020. The single-stream recycling program and glass processing is expecting to be in place and operational by October 2020.

Part of the Recycle 906 program allows for the accepting and processing of glass, which is expected to be operational by October 2020 also. The Authority is partnering with Michigan Tech University regarding possible uses of the product in concrete, countertops, black top, chip seal, sand-blasting material, and other. Representative Cambensy is looking into possible state monies to help with research.

Garbage Holidays

Garbage is affected by a holiday ONLY IF the holiday falls on a Tuesday or Wednesday. The only holiday for the 2020 garbage schedule is Wednesday, November 11 (Veteran's Day). Pickup will be Tuesday as usual, and Wednesday's route will be picked up on Thursday, November 12.

Garbage Crew Reminders:

Please shovel out your cans and keep your garbage area clear. Place cans or bags where they are visible with snowbanks, such as the far side of your driveway from the direction we approach.

Have your garbage out by 5 am.

Do not put out large items or bags heavier than 30 pounds.

Replace any cans that are cracked or broken.

The Sands Township Cemetery is located on Miller Road. Water is available at the fire tank for plants and flowers. Please NO VEHICLES AT ANY TIME ON THE GRASS AREAS!



Lots are available at a cost of \$250 for residents, and \$350 for non residents. General cemetery maintenance is done by Nick LaMere. Graves are dug by Jamin Wonch, and Ron Tervo performs the lawn maintenance. Our cemetery sexton is Tom Redlon. ROADS & ROUND-ABOUT 2020

Each year we make progress on our plan to maintain our roads. We partner with the Marquette County Road Commission (MCRC) who manages and oversees projects for all the townships. Projects currently submitted to MCRC for estimates include chip & fog seal for Sicotte, Linda, Curtis, Jack and Sheryl; crack seal for Dahlstrom, Miller and part of Yelle Road; and paving a portion of Silver Creek Road. How much of this work can be accomplished in 2020 will depend on cost estimates for each piece of the project. We attempt to complete as much work as possible, but sometimes a portion of the work needs to be deferred due to total cost. We also have to see how the new section of Silver Creek holds up because we have a maintenance obligation with MCRC. We're hoping the double chip seal put on the new portion of Silver Creek holds up well since that should reduce our maintenance costs. The double chip seal is a collaborative experiment between Sands Township and MCRC and while other counties downstate have used that

method, we aren't sure how it will work with our winters. We have a 5-year road plan and hold to it as much as we can, barring unforeseen problems that demand attention.

We've also had many questions about getting a round-about at the CR480 and M553 intersection. This is a complex proposal which would involve the township, MCRC and MI Department of Transportation. Round-abouts are expensive so funding is a significant issue. We are compiling information and sketching out strategies so the township would be in a position to move forward if an opportunity opened up. Those opportunities could include MDOT preparing for an overlay project near the intersection, grant availability, township funding, and community support. CENSUS 2020—WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

Every 10 years, the U.S. conducts a census to determine the number of people living in the United states. This information determines how many seats your state gets in Congress, and the data is used to draw boundaries for state and local legislative districts and school districts. This information also helps communities create jobs, provide housing, fund K-12 education, prepare for emergencies and build schools, roads, hospitals, and libraries.

Census forms will be mailed to households in March 2020. Every person in the household needs to be counted, even children. The forms ask for name, gender, age, birthday, race/ethnicity, relationship to head-of-household, whether you are own o rent, and phone number.

You can now fill out census forms online using the unique Census ID that will be mailed to you. You can also respond by phone or email. Your information is not shared with anyone and strong security measures are in place to protect your information.

If you do not respond to the March mailing, reminder letters will be mailed. The self-response deadline is July 2020.

We encourage you to fill out this information promptly and to make sure everyone in the household is counted accurately. A lot of the funding Sands Township receives is linked to our population as recorded in the Census.
